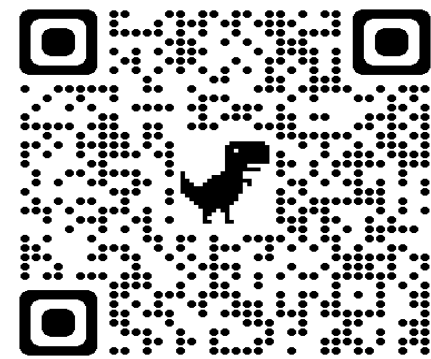

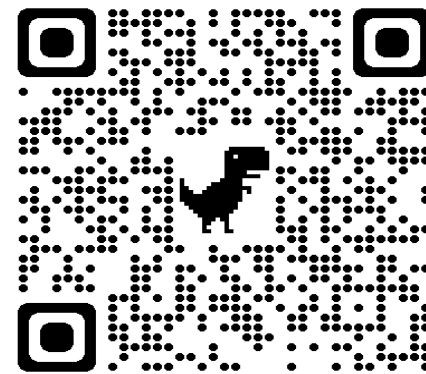

THE OPEN GOV CHALLENGE



Open
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OGP launched the Open Gov Challenge to address these issues.

OGP members must rise to the challenge by:

- accelerating ambitious reforms across the Partnership towards lasting policy change
- showcasing the power of collective action enabled by open government and OGP



Challenge 1: Access to Information

Improve effectiveness of access to information legal frameworks.

Challenge 2: Anti-Corruption

Develop or strengthen a whole-of-government anti-corruption strategy or roadmap.

Challenge 3: Civic Space

Strengthen enabling environment and spaces for civil society and civic action.

Challenge 4: Climate and Environment

Use open government to strengthen implementation of strategies or agreements on climate and environment.

Challenge 5: Digital Governance

Strengthen transparency and public oversight of AI and data protection frameworks.

Challenge 6: Fiscal Openness

Advance public oversight and inclusion reforms across the budget and spending cycle.

Challenge 7: Gender

Adopt open government reforms to promote the full participation of women politically, socially and economically.

Challenge 8: Justice

Advance people-centered justice reforms.

Challenge 9: Media Freedom

Develop or reinforce legal frameworks that protect the rights of journalists and independent media.

Challenge 10: Public Participation

Mainstream or embed fit-for-purpose, high quality and inclusive public participation practices across key government sectors, processes, and institutions.

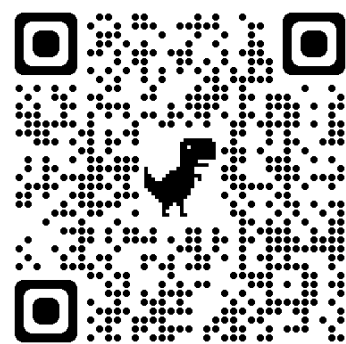

Open
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Who Can Participate

- ✓ Any government institution across all branches and levels of government of an OGP member.
- ✓ Members are encouraged to participate in as many Challenge areas as possible.
- ⚠ Civil society can co-create and support a Challenge, but it must be owned and implemented by a government institution.



Ways to Participate

- ✓ Co-create relevant commitments in OGP action plans.
- ✓ Submit a standalone action/commitment, independent of the OGP action plan.

Eligible Actions

- ✔ Reforms that advance the Challenge headline and suggested actions in the Open Government Guide.
- ✔ Ongoing or planned reforms, with future milestones.
- ✔ Must have clear open government values - transparency, public accountability or civic participation, embedded in them.



Rules

Standalone actions/commitments:

- ✓ Must meet the criteria of the Challenge
- ✓ Co-creation is encouraged
- ✓ May be submitted through the Expression of Interest for on the OGP website at any time.
- ✓ Challenge submitters/implementers will be invited to self-report on some progress before the mid-term and end-of-term Challenge review.

The Challenge Offers

- ✓ Political opportunity to fast track progress.
- ✓ Visibility, learning, and credibility.
- ✓ Technical and peer assistance.
- ✓ Opportunities to lead cohorts, peers.
- ✓ Recognition in the form of awards, spotlighting through comms, events etc.



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
